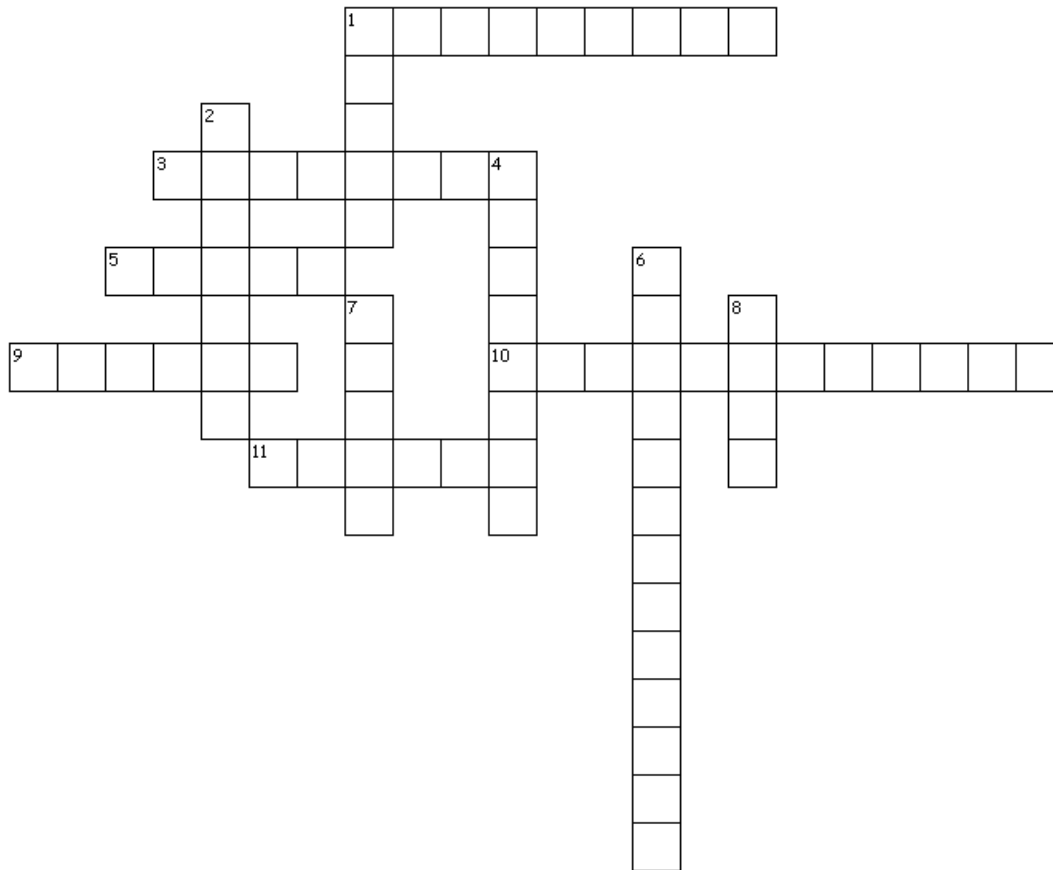


Eco-tourism Puzzle
