Department News: World Languages

Ms. Frisbee's Spanish 3R classes enjoyed presenting their travel projects in Spanish by using the past tense and vocabulary from the travel unit. Students researched and learned about different Spanish speaking countries and created presentations that highlighted the country's location, popular travel sites, unique history and famous foods. Their creativity was showcased in the creation of their own handmade souvenirs reflecting their country's rich culture.











Ms. Beck's Spanish 2R classes practiced their interpersonal skills by creating skits about experiences in Spanish restaurants. This activity was part of the Restaurant and Food Unit in Spanish 2R. To prepare for the presentations students researched restaurants in Spain and learned about the authentic foods served. Students were able to create videos or present their skits live to the class. Students enjoyed acting the part of clients and waiters and practicing the skills needed for real-world communication.







Department News: Science

Biology-

Students in Mrs. Shields and Mr. DiGennaro's Co-Taught Biology class applied the concepts of the cell membrane by creating a "Bubble Membrane". They enjoyed testing the flexibility, self-recovery, and over fun of playing with bubbles!





Biology-

Students in Ms. Zuccarelli's Biology classes have been unpacking the Cells Unit! Utilizing indicators, microscopy skills, and student provided pond water samples, they have: created a model cell to observe diffusion, manipulated solute concentrations to cause plant plasmolysis, and charted behavior of protists and simple animals under the microscope!



Conceptual Science -Students in Mr. Leiter's Conceptual Science class applied the concepts of the ideal gas law and thermodynamics to create (and launch) hot air balloons!





Earth Science -

Earth Science students have been investigating how dewpoint and relative humidity measurements play a role in weather prediction. Students in Mrs. Mallozzi's class used sling psychrometers to compare the dew point temperature and relative humidity of the air inside and outside of their classroom.



Science Research -

January marks the halfway point in the year! First year students are preparing for their first article presentations. Juniors are on the search for mentors and summer programs to continue or expand on their experiences and many project proposals are being finalized. Seniors are starting to get their college acceptances and we shift their work toward exploring opportunities at the next level.

Physics -

Physics students are crafting devices to prevent eggs from breaking when dropped from the school's second floor. Applying their knowledge of impulse and momentum, they design these protective contraptions. All physics classes will then participate in our annual Egg Drop STEM Competition! ENL Biology-

Can you find the moths? The ENL Bio 1B worked on a lab about peppered moths and how they have adapted to their environment. This lab helped the ENL Biology students learn the Theory of Natural Selection by trying to camouflage their moths so they couldn't be found by "predators". They had so much fun choosing the different locations in the classroom to best hide their moths. They did such a great job!











Marine Bio Marine Bio has been studying the anatomy of different types of fish. They tested their knowledge on the dissection of a perch and a lamprey.





IB Sports Exercise -

SA node -> AV node -> Bundle of His -> purkinje fibers... The IB sports class has been studying the anatomy and physiology of the heart. They dissected a pig heart and was able to map out the flow of blood and the intrinsic regulation of the pacemaker.

Ninth grade:

Students in Mrs. Sevastian's, Ms. Leviton's, and Ms. Riccoboni's classes created original bookmarks with important images, symbols, and words from the first half of Laurie Halse Anderson's novel, *Speak*. The students took time to plan the layout and components of both sides of a bookmark. Next, they used colored pencils and markers to transfer their designs, quotes, and patterns to a cardstock bookmark – complete with lamination and bright tassel! Their finished products became wonderful tools for review, as well as a token to keep and use as we continue reading *Speak*.



Tenth grade:

Students in Ms. Popkave's 10H class created one pagers to display their analysis of a significant moment from chapters 20-24 of *Jane Eyre*. Students chose a moment that developed characterization or conflict, illustrated a symbol, archetype, or allusion, created a specific mood, foreshadowed something, or illuminated a theme.



Students in Ms. Leviton's 10th Grade in English Class worked in groups to create and draw their own islands as a pre-reading activity for *Lord of the Flies*. Students not only drew maps of the islands, but they came up with sets of rules, survival lists, and determined how they would work together to survive. Each group presented their creative islands to their class upon completion. This activity helped students' see from the perspective of the characters in Lord of the Flies before beginning the book.







Eleventh grade:

Could you explain the plot of the story in only five images? That's what students in Mrs. Stein-Jackter and Mrs. Alvarenga's 11R classes had to do. Using props and the space around them (and themselves), students had to take five pictures which traced the plot of The Crucible. Each group was also assigned a specific literary technique to demonstrate in their images.







Ms. Herbst's and Ms. Fischer's classes recently wrapped up an argument unit by holding a town hall debate regarding whether their fictitious school should eliminate athletic programs. Students created characters, researched their assigned pov, and practiced persuasive techniques in their debates. Currently, students are beginning their college and post-high school research papers. They will learn about the formal research process and evaluate the possibilities for life after high school.

12 Honors: Mrs. Basciano's 12 Honors students have been working on their science fiction short stories inspired by their reading of *The Time Machine* by H.G. Wells. Students took a current technological/social issue and imagined what the world would be like in the future. As part of this assignment, students were tasked with answering a central "What if" question they wanted to explore in their story. Students topics include: What if AI takes the place of human beings? What would happen if Earth was uninhabitable? What if humans become too dependent on technology? What if chips were embedded in humans? What if robots enslaved the human race? What if humans had special powers? Students really put their imaginations to work envisioning the possible future of mankind!





Intro to College English/ENL: Ms. Phalen's students are reading and listening to Trevor Noah's memoir Born A Crime. After a pre-reading <u>infographic</u> project, they paused midway to create unique designs for bookmarks.

















AP Lit: Students created presentations to map out the storm, a major turning point, in the novel *A Thousand Acres*. Presentations varied from wonderful videos to posters to interactive computer programs, slideshows, and Jamboards. Students had complete freedom in how they showcased this important scene in the text.

IB Theory of Knowledge: Students in IB ToK began their unit on Knowledge and the Knower, focusing on the importance of selective attention and change blindness by taking a test of their attention. Students also discussed how their education has shaped them into the knowers they are today.

IB English Year 1: Students in IB Year 1 have been busy practicing their close reading analysis skills in a small group carousel activity. In groups, students took turns discussing their own interpretation of short extracts from the novel *Their Eyes Were Watching God* by Zora Neale Hurston. After each student shared, the group members decided which words, phrases, and or lines should be highlighted and helped them develop an understanding of the author's message. Once all the group members came to a consensus about the author's overall purpose in the extract, they put all their observations on a poster. Then, each group moved to another group's poster to read their commentary. The groups added their own ideas on sticky notes and placed them on the posters. After student groups visited all the posters, they came back to their original posters and read all their classmates' comments. Through this collaborative exercise, everyone had a chance to speak, and students were well- prepared for the next step: the close reading analysis paper!

Public Speaking: In the first week of public speaking, students are participating in warm up activities to get them comfortable standing up in front of the class. First, students interviewed each other and then introduced their partners to the class. Next, we participated in a wonder hour. Each student randomly selected another person's wonder to research and present on.

Writer's Workshop: In Writer's Workshop 1, students finished the course with Ekphrastic Poetry, and responded to famous pieces of artwork through poetry. Students in Writer's Workshop 2 began their interactive food unit; the first assignment had writers connecting personally to food through poetry. Next up: a fun musical smells lesson that will have students smelling herbs and spices from all over the world and writing about the emotions that they evoke!

With the change in semesters, we have bid farewell to our first semester art courses. It has become a tradition in Pottery to have a party on the last day that utilizes students' final projects. Students brought in food and/or flowers to serve or display in their handmade dishes. This is always a fun way to celebrate the course!

Department News: Social Studies

School Resource Officers Chris Woulfe and Jay Vejnoska visited Mr. Turner's and Ms. Jesnes' AP Government classes. While the main topic of discussion was the "rights of the accused" as found in the Bill of Rights, the SRO's shared a wide range of information about the role of police, the role of SRO's specifically, the variety of opportunities available as a police officer, and some interesting anecdotes about their jobs. Thank you to both of them.

From January 18-21st, Advisors Mrs. Darcy and Mrs. Macias took the Clarkstown Model United Nations Team to Yale Model UN. This was Yale's MUN 50th anniversary and it was a weekend to be remembered. Our students ate pizza from Frank Pepe's in New Haven - in the original location in our own private room. The manager gave us a tour of the restaurant that opened in 1925. We then traveled to the Omni Hotel and prepared to debate topics and write resolutions all weekend. At the Opening Ceremony we heard inspiring words from Ban Ki-moon. He told the students, "Are you ready to extend your hand and become a global citizen?" Along with going to the Yale Museum we were able to visit Yale's Library/Museum where students were able to view the Gutenberg Bible, 1 of only 49 copies in the world today. Clarkstown students debated with over 2000 students from all 50 states and representatives from 44 countries around the world. We were also able to attend a Lecture by a Professor of Psychology that really wowed the students with his studies in perception. Our next competition will be in February at Suffern and Pearl River High Schools.

DECA provides students the opportunity to prepare for careers in Business Management, Administration, Entrepreneurship, Finance, Hospitality, Tourism, and Marketing. At the beginning of January, North DECA attended the regional competition at RCC. We had several students place in the top 5! North will have 32 students moving on to compete in the state competition March 6-8 in Rochester, NY.



Starting in late January the Global History 2 classes, along with their peers from Clarkstown South, are going to visit the Rockland Holocaust Museum for their Moral Courage Workshop. In this workshop, the first of which was on January 29, students will learn to define moral courage and its importance in our society today. They will analyze examples from history and learn what moral courage looks like in practice, from a variety of perspectives across race, class, gender, age, and geography. The first group of students went on January 29 and was thoroughly engaged in wrestling with these historical and social issues.







Ms. Santiago's Public Policy class finished up their semester long project in which they did extensive research on a Societal Problem and created public policies to alleviate these problems. During the process they create professional presentations of their societal problems and policies. The presentations provide give them the opportunity to get feedback from peers. Throughout the process they Evaluate Costs and Benefits create Policy Memos. Topics this year included

Domestic Violence NYS, Overdevelopment in Rockland County, Lack of Affordable Housing in NYS and Increased discrimination against the formerly incarcerated in New York State

Throughout the process the students contacted and worked with various stakeholder and influential players and organizations such as State Senator Bill Weber, James Lloyd the New York State Association for Affordable Housing, Alyssa DeRosa from the New York State Office for the Prevention of Domestic Violence, and Exodus Transitional Community.

One group's Policy Memo was so well received by the New York State Office for the Prevention of Domestic Violence that it is being shared with their the entire department for consideration.


